

Jovid Foundation Grants Awarded in 1999

In 1999, the Foundation's grants fell into five areas: Employment and Training Programs and Evaluation; Economic and Poverty Research; Arts/Education; Foundation/Nonprofit Institutional Support; and, Other. In 1999, the Foundation paid grants totaling \$347,908.

Adult Employment and Training Programs and Evaluation (Total: \$304,908)

Support for adult education and GED preparation classes for low-income DC residents.	
<i>Byte Back!</i>	\$15,000
For support of computer training at various DC locations for homeless and low-income adults and youth.	
<i>Calvary Bilingual Multicultural Learning Center</i>	\$ 7,500
To assist in establishing an early childhood training certification program for low-income DC residents.	
<i>Capital Hill Group Ministry (STRIVE)</i>	\$25,000
A three-to-one challenge grant toward the establishment in the District of Columbia of STRIVE DC, a job-readiness program, for the difficult-to-employ.	
<i>Carlos Rosario International Career Center</i>	\$10,000
To support Intermediate English-as-a-Second Language courses for low-income adults and youth.	
<i>The Children's Foundation</i>	\$ 5,000
To help support a training program for in-home childcare providers.	
<i>Community Council for the Homeless at Friendship Place</i>	\$ 2,500
To support the provision of job readiness and skills training for homeless men and women in the District of Columbia.	
<i>Community Family Life Services, Inc.</i>	\$25,000
The final year of a two-year capstone grant (total: \$100,000) to support the campaign to provide services for forty homeless families and children in DC.

To assist the food preparation and service training program for homeless women.

Efforts: Employment for Former Offenders Receiving Treatment Services \$10,000

General operating support for this program that provides job-readiness training and GED preparation for ex-offenders.

Enterprise Development International \$10,000

To support business education training and a micro credit program for residents of Ward 8.

The Enterprise Foundation \$25,000

The final year of a three-year grant (total: \$75,000) to support the Community Employment Alliance being established to formulate strategies and implement programs to create an effective job-opportunity system for the economically disadvantaged in D.C.

To support GED preparation, occupational and skills training for adjudicated youth fourteen to seventeen years of age.

The Family Place \$ 5,000

General support of the literacy, ESL and GED preparation program for low-income families in DC.

To assist in funding a Jobs Coach for the Supported Employment Program for formerly homeless and abused women who are residents in a House of Ruth facility.

To assist in supporting the job placement and Move Up programs for unemployed women and men in DC.

Arts/Education (Total: \$30,000)

Arena Stage *\$25,000*
The final year of a two-year grant to support capital campaign planning costs for this nonprofit regional theater (total: \$50,000).

Washington Performing Arts Society *\$ 5,000*
To support the community education and outreach program.

Foundation/Nonprofit Institutional Support (Total: \$3,000)

The Foundation Center *\$ 1,000*
General support for this community resource for information on foundations, grant writing and funding.

The Support Center of Washington *\$ 2,000*
General support of training workshops for nonprofit organizations.

Other (Total: \$200,000)

Maine Community Foundation/Island Education Fund *\$200,000*
